
Choose PrEP









Did you say "no" because you don't want anyone to know you're having sex?

Did you say "no" because you want to keep your private life... private?

PrEP is a great option for HIV **prevention** - you might need this in the future, get back to us whenever you're ready.

More Health Tips:

- All PrEP methods can be used together with **contraception** (except, the PrEP ring can not be used together with the contraceptive ring.).
- · Visit your clinic for regular STI screening, PrEP is safe with other medications, even the ones used to treat other STIs.
- If you are currently pregnant and/or breastfeeding, ask your healthcare provider which PrEP methods may work for you.
- Condoms prevent STIs and unintended pregnancy AND you should always try to use them together with your preferred PrEP method.

REMINDER: Check for signs of acute HIV infection (AHI) and screen for recent exposure to HIV - the PrEP Ring has a very low chance of causing resistance to ARVs, and is therefore a good option if your are cautious due to the AHI screening/waiting period.

- Condoms

NOTE:

If your client is seeking prevention AFTER an **HIV exposure: PEP should** be used but must be given as soon as possible and within 72hrs (3 days) **AFTER a possible exposure** to HIV, and can be used together with emergency contraception and STI testing.

Eligible for PrEP

Discuss the benefits, drawbacks, details, and commitment required for each PrEP product. Allow your client to make an informed decision!

Oral PrEP

- One pill a day, every day for as long as needed
- More than 90% effective
- Prevents HIV from any form of exposure
- Some side effects, only in first month of use
- Does not prevent other STIs
- Does not prevent HIV AFTER an exposure
- ▼ Initiate, return to clinic 1 month later and then only once every 3 months

PrEP Ring

- Placed in the vagina for 28 days, then replaced*
- More than 50% effective
- Prevents HIV only for vaginal sex
- Very minimal side effects
- Does not prevent other STIs
- Does not prevent HIV AFTER an exposure
- ♥ Initiate, return to clinic 1 month later and then only once every 3 months

CAB-LA

- One injection every 2 months
- More than 90% effective. compared to oral PrEP
- Prevents HIV from any form of exposure
- Some side effects, but these are minimal
- Does not prevent other STIs
- Does not prevent HIV AFTER an exposure
- ♥ Initiate, return to clinic 1 month later and then only once every 2 months
- ♥ Note for HCP: Check potential contraindications for any of the above PrEP drug regimen
- * HCPs may need to offer additional support to clients, the PrEP ring is still relatively new and a client may need some time to get used to and comfortable with using this method. PrEP ring use does get easier with time! A client who initiates on any PrEP method may also need your support with continuation, effective use, and committing to their clinic visit schedule.

Some of these methods can be used while a person is pregnant and/or breastfeeding, check your country's guidelines for the correct information.
